Library Research Assignment: College Composition

Using tools and resources introduced in the Library Research Instruction Sessions, create an Annotated Bibliography of four sources directly related to your research topic. Include one of each of the following:

- 1. Article from a Subject Encyclopedia (book) found in the Reference Area of Ryan Library
- 2. **Book** found using *WorldCat*.
- 3. **Full-Text Article** found in one of the Databases available through the Ryan Library webpage (Try *Academic Search Premier* or *JSTOR*)
- 4. **Internet Source** (site not provided by PLNU and not from one of the Databases in #3 above)

Instructions

At the top of your **typed**, **double-spaced document**, include the following information:

- Your name
- Your professor's name and your class day/time
- Your research topic

For each source:

- 1. Cite each source in proper MLA format (see Chapter 32 in St. Martin's Handbook).
- 2. Alphabetize the list of sources as you would in any bibliography; double-space the document.
- 3. Write a short paragraph that includes the following information about each source:
 - What kind of source is this (journal article, book, subject encyclopedia article, website)
 - What *type* of information will this source provide for the paper (stats, overview, news, etc.)?
 - What **evidence** suggests that this source is trustworthy/credible?
 - What **search tool** was used (WorldCat, Academic Search Premier, JSTOR, Google, etc.)?
 - What search terms were typed into that search tool to locate this source?

Turning in your Assignment

- File name: Name the file using your prof's last name and your last name—ex: SmithChavez
- File format: Save and submit as a **Microsoft Word** document.
- File submission: Upload file to the Library Research Instruction Module on Canvas.

"History." Point Loma Nazarene U, n.d. Web. 31 Jan. 2014. (Note: Since no author was given, title is listed first. Since no date was found, use "n.d.")

BLOG POST with title:

Ataide, Randy M. "Are Farmers Markets a Good Deal?" *Sensu Lato*. N.p., 10 Aug. 2012. Web. 31 Jan. 2014.

YOUTUBE video:

Lddarby. "Dancing Nazarenes." *YouTube*. N.p., 1 Oct. 2006. Web. 31 Jan. 2014.

(Note: N.p. stands for "No Publisher." Use this for any user-generated content. YouTube is not considered the publisher since it has no responsibility for the content of the site.)
